Pine Siskins are found in coniferous and deciduous forests from central Alaska and northern Canada as far south as Guatemala. With a cold-defying high metabolism and an insulating layer of fat, if seeds are plentiful they can winter in their breeding territories. In lean years they may roam in flocks, commandeering bird feeders across the continent. In legendary winters, in a phenomenon called an irruption, over 95 million have been counted, some wandering a half continent from their breeding grounds.
